Honours and Awards

Dr Max Keniry, was awarded a Yamagiwa-Yoshida Travel Fellowship from the International Union against cancer.

Mr David Lupton, a PhD candidate in the Synthesis and Mechanism Group, received the prize for the poster showing the most creative chemistry at the RACI Organic Chemistry Annual Symposium held at the University of Western Sydney on December 3rd.
